Carol Burwash reported on the Pancake Breakfast/Lunch. There was a total of 108 diners, and after expenses, the club should clear approximately \$550.00 for this fund raiser.







Darrell reminded the board members that there was a meeting on Wednesday, February 7<sup>th</sup> at noon at Tuscany's.



Beth Riefsteck reported that the K-Kids were doing extremely well in raising funds for their Children from Chernobyl project. They have raised almost \$1,000.00.

On Tuesday, February 6<sup>th</sup> the K-Kids' pins will be given out at the East Prairie Library at 12:30P.M.

Darrell Helm and Mike Damler inducted our newest member, John Davis. He was

Our speaker, Chub Conner, was provided by Clarice Hausman. Chub is a Community Relations Specialist with Lincoln's ChalleNGe Academy in Rantoul. Chub shared information about the academy, its goals and its students.

The Lincoln's ChalleNGe Academy is currently on its 28<sup>th</sup> class and starting its fifteenth year of operation. The program has become immensely popular and has the potential of providing thousands of "at-risk" young men and women in Illinois with a new start. Where traditional educational methods have failed, the Lincoln's ChalleNGe Academy has succeeded and proved to be a tremendous

alternative for young people who have the ability to excel, but need an intensive, structured environment.

The graduates of the Lincoln's ChalleNGe Academy are disciplined and accomplished. They are on the road to becoming successful and contributing members of society and their community.

Lincoln's ChalleNGe is an investment in the future of Illinois communities. The cost to society without this program could be much greater if our youth are lost to unemployment, welfare, drugs, gangs or the judicial system. Current federal legislation provides a full time commitment to the Youth ChalleNGe Programs across the nation.

The following 8-core objectives are the goals established by the National Guard Bureau as the criteria for each cadet attending a Youth Challenge Program:

- 1. Academic Excellence pertains to the cadet increasing their educational grade level and/or obtaining a GED. The cadet must also pursue continuing their education or obtaining verifiable employment.
- 2. Job Skills includes the completion of the Armed Forces Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB), conducting personal career research, construction of a resume, responding to job advertisements and demonstrating interview skills. The cadet must demonstrate knowledge and skills required to seek, obtain and maintain employment.
- 3. Physical Fitness is determined by the participation in regularly scheduled physical fitness training, as well as demonstrating knowledge of fitness concepts. The cadets must improve their level of fitness in all categories of the President's Council on Physical Fitness Training.
- 4. Leadership/Followership concerns several aspects of leadership. The cadet will hold a leadership position on their team. They must show evidence of personal motivation and self-discipline on a continuing basis. Cadets must demonstrate moral and ethical leadership skills, good citizen values, respect for oneself and others, honesty and loyalty.
- 5. Health, Sex Education & Nutrition consist of the cadet demonstrating an understanding of substance abuse on physical health and well being. They must show an understanding of proper nutrition, sexually transmitted diseases and the importance of achieving good health.
- 6. Life Coping Skills is one of the most all-encompassing objectives of the program. This involves the understanding of basic economics and personal financial management, personal coping strategies (i.e., ability to deal with emotions such as anger, grief), conflict resolution strategies and the ability to set and achieve goals.

- 7. Responsible Citizenship will enable cadets to have a basic understanding of the Constitution and U.S. Government. This includes an understanding of the election and voting process. Students participating in the student government accomplish this by serving as a committee member or a student government officer.
- 8. Community Service is accomplished by cadets participating in the planning, conduct and completion of community service projects and must complete 40 hours of community service activities. This is designed to give cadets an understanding of their role as a community member and the need to assist those in need.

A youth attending a Challenge Program must achieve 80% of each objective's criteria, and he/she must complete all eight objectives before graduating from the Resident Phase and moving into the Post Resident Phase. A local mentor is provided for 12 months to each successful student when they leave the academy.

These objectives are taught during the 200 hours of classroom instruction and during daily activities. Cadets also attend classes for computer literacy to become familiar with current computer programs.

The Lincoln's ChalleNGe Academy is run by active members of the Illinois National Guard and retired military personnel. All instructors are certified teachers, and program counselors are qualified and experienced professionals.

The Resident Phase is the first five and a half (5.5) months spent in Rantoul at the ChalleNGe facility. The days are long, and the mental and physical activities are rigorous with very limited personal time. In addition to the physical training and classroom instruction, each cadet is required to complete 40 hours of community service activities as well as play an important role in the upkeep of living quarters and training facilities.

Cadets receive a weekly stipend of \$10 to cover incidentals and encourage good money management skills. Meals, bedding, and clothing are all provided and there are no costs to the cadet or their family for participation in the program.

During the Resident Phase, cadets are supervised at all times and remain at the facility unless participating in an authorized, off-site activity. There are scheduled breaks when all cadets return home for a specified amount of time, such as Thanksgiving or Easter. If a cadet misses more than five (5) days of training, they are immediately considered for dismissal from the program. Cadets may also be

dismissed for successive disciplinary problems or if they fail one of the random drug tests.

#### What are the criteria for admission?

Volunteer; 16-18 years old high school dropout by the start of the new class; resident of Illinois and a US citizen or legal resident; not currently involved in the legal system or have a court case pending; drug free at the start of class.


### Meeting of February 12, 2007

There was a total attendance of 24 members and 1 guest, our speaker, Dorothy Kennett.



Amanda will need treatments everyday for her entire life to control AIDS unless a cure is found.

On her latest trip, with funds provided by donors such as our club, computers were installed in the library. More software

is needed and little is available there locally. A "Life Skills" training program targeted for ages 15-25 was developed, and the building was remodeled to support this program. The training will include child development, nutrition, first aid, arts, music, literature, English and more. The training is scheduled to begin in March. Dorothy shared many pictures from this latest trip.

# **Highlights from the February 2007 Board Meeting**

• <u>January Monthly Report</u> – Wayne Ward reported that only 8 members turned in service hours so he relied on the general activities of the group. The report indicated a total of 453 public service hours accomplished by club members in January.

- <u>Treasurer's Report</u> –Candy Hudson reported that all but 6 members had paid their semi-annual dues. The annual club dues for Kiwanis International and the I-I District have been paid in the amount of \$4,210.00. The net income from the Pancake Breakfast is approx. \$550.00. The current balance in the Treasury is \$4,436.94 as of 2-5-07.
- Pancake Breakfast/Lunch The Board agreed that the additional time from 10:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. was not productive, therefore next year's breakfast will not have the additional time. At least 30 members participated in this event....Kudos to the club members!!
- 21<sup>st</sup> Anniversary Party –Mike Damler reported that the event would be March 24<sup>th</sup> at his home. A notice will be provided to each member at a later date.
- <u>Hugh O-Brian Youth Program (H.O.B.Y.)</u> Information was received from H.O.B.Y. The Tuscola Woman's Club has traditionally sponsored a high school student to attend this youth training evernt. Kiwanis International has now started their own "Key Leadership" program for high school age youth. They sponsor events throughout the United States. There is one "key Leadership" event to be hold in Illinois.
- <u>Missionary Support Request</u> A request was received from Molly Lehman to assist financially and through prayers with her planned missionary trip. The board decided to pass an envelope at a couple of club meetings for voluntary member donations. (Update: At the February 26<sup>th</sup> meeting, the members were advised that Molly will not be making the trip after all.)
- <u>Lt. Governor Report</u> Mike Damler, Division 27 Lt. Governor, was present for an official visit to the Board. He reported that Larry Bechtel, Decatur Golden K, was elected as Division 27 Lt. Governor for fiscal year 2007/2008. Mike gave Darrell Helm 10 tickets for an I-I District fund raiser. The tickets are \$10.00 each with the winners to be drawn at the I-I District Convention in Rockford in August. Mike also reported that Division 27 is growing in membership. The Sullivan Club is possibly gaining 6-7 new members.
